

It's a pleasure, to be with you as you hold your annual general meeting. It's my sincere pleasure to be here with you today and to extend warm greetings on behalf of our National Office, our constituent members across the country, and your fellow Certified Technicians and Technologists. I am certain that much will be gained from your discussions here and I am truly honored to have the opportunity to contribute to these proceedings.

The past year has been a busy one for CCTT, one which has brought with it many accomplishments and opportunities and that has drawn the attention of internal and external stakeholders alike. If I may, I would like to spend just a couple of minutes updating you on the highlights of our priority initiatives – all of which are focused on one critical objective – creating value for you our Provincial Associations which we refer to as a Constituent Members or CMs.

When assessing value, one measure often used is ROI – Return on Investment -- a concept which takes on even greater importance in these particularly challenging times. So what is it exactly that CCTT does to generate ROI for Constituent Members? Quite simply, we do things that you, our Constituent Members, and individual technicians and technologists, do not do or are not mandated to do. This involves activities that are typically national or international in scope that serve the collective interests of our Federation and/or that fall outside of the provincial jurisdiction of our Constituent Members. This productive and symbiotic relationship between Constituent Members and the National Office ensures not only that the interests of technicians and technologists are represented, provincially, nationally and internationally, but also that as a profession, we are positioned increase our ranks and to contribute to Canada's long term competitiveness, prosperity and economic success.

That said, an overriding strategic focus for CCTT, inherent in almost all its activities, is membership development on a macro level. In other words, creating the conditions nationally and internationally that will cause greater numbers of technicians and technologists to seek membership and Certification from our Constituent Members nationwide. How are we doing this? Well, for starters, CCTT is focused on increasing the numbers of Canadians involved in the technology professions by promoting technology careers to Canada's youth and Certification within the profession overall. Each year National Technology Week galvanizes support nationwide around this cause with activities across the country that engage thousands of students and educators focusing on technology career options.

This program is made possible almost entirely through volunteers, and a five year \$250,000 sponsorship solicited by the national office, which has increased the annual NTW budget by over 10 fold – now that's pretty good ROI. CCTT is also working closely with the National Council of Deans of Technology (NCDoT) to identify strategies and programs aimed at improving enrollments in technology programs nation-wide. Similarly, we are partnered with Engineers Canada on the completion of an HRSDC-funded two-year Technology Labour Market Study of the engineering and technology sector. Soon to be completed, the landmark findings of this study will be used to formulate recommendations, policies and strategic initiatives related to skills and labour development – another example of how CCTT as a national body brings resources and leverages partnerships for the benefit of all members.

In addition to promoting Canadian participation in the technology professions, CCTT has also identified the recruitment and integration of skilled immigrants as a key element within its broader national technical skills development strategy. Current demographic trends clearly indicate that increased reliance on immigration as a source of skilled labour will be paramount in maintaining labour market equilibrium over the long term. Immigration accounted for 70 percent of Canada's labour force growth in the 1990s and current estimates suggest that it will represent 100 percent of our labour force growth by 2011. Clearly, foreign trained technicians and technologists represent a large and increasingly critical source of potential new members for our CM's and a target market we must address. With this stark reality in mind, and with funding support made available from Human Resources and Social Development Canada's (HRSDC), Foreign Credential Recognition Program, CCTT is now developing a Skilled Immigrant Employment Network – The SIEN. This 30 month project will expand Canada's technical skills inventory by increasing the numbers of foreign-trained technology professionals seeking Certification from our CMs. SIEN will engage the CM's directly in the process of developing programs and building capacity that will expedite credential recognition and ultimately their ability to attract and retain new members – now that's ROI! SIEN will also serve an important education function in managing the expectations of foreign trained engineering professionals prior to their arrival, regarding credential recognition and employability as technicians and/or technologists in Canada.

On the government relations front, CCTT's newly-formed Government Relations committee is ramping-up outreach activities designed to focus attention on key priorities. Just this month, letters were sent to selected ministers requesting meetings and to all members of parliament outlining elements of CCTT's ambitious government relations agenda. Priorities identified included: public sector hiring practices; promotion of careers in the technology profession, immigration policies encouraging skilled immigrant inflows; and uniform legislation on right to practice. In response, we have already received numerous letters from parliamentarians commending us for our leadership and offering support on these issues. Staff at the National Office are now working with the GR committee on a series of National Position Papers that will frame our discussions with policy makers in each of these issue areas.

I had mentioned earlier that CCTT has not only received increased attention from outside this past year, but also from within the family, in the form of an independent 3<sup>rd</sup> party review of CCTT operations. Vancouver –based Association Management Consultants recently presented the report of their independent study to provincial association Presidents who had gathered in Toronto for the occasion. This Third Party Review had been called for, some six months earlier, by a number of provincial Presidents and had been agreed to by the CCTT Board of Directors. The main challenge of the study was to address the perception that the leaderships of the provincial councils and the national body were not communicating adequately with one another. It was felt that under such conditions misunderstandings leading to disagreements on a range of subjects could result. For its part, the CCTT Board considered a fundamental review of the operations of the federation to be a very healthy exercise. Accordingly, the consultants were asked to review governance and management systems, processes and policies currently in place at CCTT and to recommend changes for improvement.

The recommendations of the study are now being studied by each of the provincial councils. A meeting of the provincial Council Presidents and their additional representatives scheduled for early April will decide which recommendations should be implemented and, of those that are to be implemented, which require By-law changes. Such changes will be ratified at the October AGM of CCTT.

For our part, CCTT appreciates the extra attention received of late through this 3<sup>rd</sup> party review process. As a national unifying body, CCTT serves to bridge inherent differences between constituent members and to address diverging views, concerns and conflicting priorities when they arise. This is another important element of the ROI quotient. Consequently, we see this review process as a positive exercise and are confident that as our members learn more about the things we are doing in their interests, that they will have a greater appreciation for the Federation and the role it plays overall.

In conclusion, I would summarize my remarks today by re-affirming that CCTT is in the business of delivering ROI for you and that is what we will continue to do. As a professional community, we must continually strive to improve communication, to break down barriers that limit our potential and to ensure that our voice is heard within the family and with outside stakeholders. I encourage you to work with us, to learn more about our mission and our efforts aimed at supporting you – the technicians and technologists of Canada.

In closing, I wish your board much success in the year ahead, and I would like to thank your past board executive and you as individual members for your continued participation and enthusiasm. As an Association, CCTT is only the sum of its many parts, and we recognize that your contributions are what make technicians and technologists in Canada a proud and connected community.

#### <u>Purpose</u>

#### <u>Eligibility</u>

In order to be eligible, the applicant must:

(c) Prove by official letter, that he/she is enrolled as a full-time student in an Engineering or Applied Science Technology Program in Canada.

#### <u>Selection</u>

Submissions must be received at the CCTT office **no later than October 1st, 2009.** All submissions will be coded and the recipients will be chosen by the lottery method. Award recipients' names will be announced annually at the CCTT Awards Banquet in conjunction with the CCTT Annual General Meeting.

#### ON BEING THE FIRST NBSCETT PUBLIC COUNCILLOR

Some three and a half years ago I was invited to take on the newly created role of Public Councillor for NBSCETT, a position I did not want because of my many activities as a recently retired civil servant. However, I was finally convinced to accept the role, both for its challenge and responsibility reasons. The idea of assuming an independent oversight function on behalf of the public interest, yet a full voting member of the NBSCETT Council, was intriguing.

So, what constituted the "public interest" in NBSC-ETT terms anyway? After reading a pile of material and attending many Council meetings, a distinct perspective of what this meant began to emerge. I hether it is the Society's certified member's f V identification stamp, the wall certificate, or the Technology ring worn by Professional Technologists and Certified Technicians (on the small finger of the working hand) these indicators announce the certified member status, and recognition within the multi-disciplinary team. Society members, as well as the public, help protect these legislated titles by reporting any misuse.

The New Brunswick Engineering Technology Act (July 1986) states it is an offence for anyone who is not a full member of the Society to use the titles in any form: Certified Engineering Technician/Technollgist, Certified Technician, Applied Science Technologist, Professional Technologist, or the like of: CET, CTech, AScT or PTech. Someone may mistakenly use a protected title, or possibly a non-member continues to display a Society wall certificate, or wear a Technology ring after being struck from the registry, giving the impression they're certified. When no longer a member, certificates and all other identifying items must be returned. For reporting details call Society office.
